Instead of waiting for people to come to Church, the Great Plains Conference is encouraging Churches to take the word of God to the people. Our lifestyles are now more diverse and involved than 40 years ago. While a great deal of our time is spent at work and home, "third places" also grab us for time. These "third places" represent the times, we are camping at the lake, attending sporting events or entertainment, exercising, eating at restaurants or coffee shops or using digital media. The Fresh Expression movement is a bold attempt to plant the gospel in the "third places" of our lives.

"A Fresh Expression is a form of church for our changing culture, established primarily for the benefit of people who are not yet members of any church. It will come into being through principles of listening, service, contextual mission and making disciples. It will have the potential to become a mature expression of church shaped by the gospel and the enduring marks of the church and for its cultural context," (p. 3-4 *Fresh Expressions, a New Kind of Methodist for People not in Church*).

The Great Plains Conference is sponsoring a Vision Day (a training event) at the Topeka First United Methodist Church on February 9. They are encouraging Church leaders to register to discover what it means to be the church in new and creative ways. Participants will also hear from Fresh Expressions practitioners, learn how to renew existing congregations through fresh expressions of church, and discern what this could mean for your region, community, or neighborhood. There will be time for active discussion as well as an opportunity to build networks and relationships among those in your area. Examples of Fresh Expressions can be (is not limited to) a Bible study formed from co-workers who meet during their lunch hour, a spiritual discussion around a campfire, a Bible study for working adults over dinner and their kids have their own craft activity or a spiritual message before an activity enjoyed by youth and adults. Every Fresh Expression initiative is going to have its own unique context. The Fresh Expression journey...listening, loving and serving, building community, exploring discipleship, the church taking shape...helps make sense of each context and the opportunities for mission that the spirit might be putting in your path. Sometimes God drops an opportunity in your lap or puts an idea on your heart or invites you to do something. **The question is: will you join with God for the adventure?**

2019 Legislative Event for Advocacy in Faith Unity of Spirit —February 17 & 18



Featured speakers include historian and author Dr. Sharon Cranford and (1979-1987) Kansas Governor John Carlin. This event is open to all. Registration is \$30 and for students \$15 by February 1. We trust that you all had a wonderful holiday with friends and family. We just celebrated Christmas this week with our kids and had such a good time. It was an unexpected blessing to be here over the holidays and we loved every minute of it.

Now that we are in January, our minds have turned to preparing to leave. We are scheduled to fly out next Saturday, January 12, arriving in CKY around 8 p.m. on January 13. We will be leaving out of Fort Wayne and traveling through Chicago, and then Brussels, and into CKY. We have friends meeting us at the airport for which we are grateful.

We are obviously excited about our return, and are looking forward to seeing what God has been doing in our absence. We have had word that the clinic is re-opened, though we are still waiting on paperwork for Dawn to work. The health care worker is new - so there will be an interesting process of finding out exactly what he is like and how capable he is. We are looking forward to seeing our national and missionary friends as well.

On the other hand, we are NOT looking forward to the looming good byes on this side of the water. That familiar catch in our throats happens whenever we, especially Dawn, thinks about leaving the family and especially those three sweet babies. Tears have already been flowing this week and we are not anticipating next week getting any easier. Would you pray for our family - not only for us but also for our kids, daughters-in-law, and granddaughters? This is the hard part of serving overseas. We are tucking away all of the wonderful memories and snuggles and love we have been blessed with over the past months.

We covet your prayers not only for our departure but also for our arrival. We are not sure what we will find when we return to the village - in many aspects.... how the believers are doing, how our friends are doing, the state of our house (and cat), what the clinic situation will be like, what has been the fallout from the clinic being closed for so long, both in terms of deaths and injuries and also relationships, etc. It is a bit daunting if we think about it - so we are grateful that we do not go alone. We are grateful for God's peace and strength, as well as the prayers of so many of you.

We plan to spend about ten days in the capital, restocking supplies, dealing with guest-house issues, helping Mr. Bah get glasses, catching up with friends, and adjusting to life back on that side of the ocean - before returning to the village.

We have lots of goodbyes, lots of travel, lots of readjustments and lots of uncertainties ahead of us. Thank you for praying with and for us!

Delegation thanks Great Plains Conference for prayers, feedback

Great Plains Conference delegates to the special session of General Conference, scheduled for Feb. 23-26, 2019, in St. Louis, Missouri have drafted this letter to United Methodists in Kansas and Nebraska. The letter shares some thoughts based on feedback delegates have received during town hall meetings and in emails and letters sent to them since August.

12/10/18 Beloved in Christ,

It's now less than three months until the special General Conference to be held in St. Louis, Missouri. Thank you for your prayers and your feedback as we engage in the hard work of discernment and decision-making on behalf of our church.

We are also thankful to Bishop Saenz and the conference staff, who held town hall meetings in each district over the last several months to present information about the proposals coming before the special General Conference. Members of the delegation were present at the town hall meetings so that we could hear concerns and questions from laity and clergy across our conference.

As of the date of this letter, we have also received more than 220 emails sent to [gcdelegates@greatplainsumc.org](mailto:gcdellegates@greatplainsumc.org) expressing opinions on one or more proposals, sharing essays, stories, and biblical references to aid our discernment. We have also had many conversations, in person and on social media, to help us hear the wide variety of viewpoints in the Great Plains.

Not surprisingly, each plan submitted to the General Conference has vocal support within our annual conference as well as vocal opposition. Our delegation, too, has members with very different viewpoints, members who support different proposals, and members who are somewhere in-between. We continue to study and learn so that we can understand the consequences of each plan from the global to the local level. We want to advocate for the best way forward for our beloved church, a way that maximizes the United Methodist witness in as many places as possible around the world. It is likely that we will not come to total agreement as a delegation. But we are working together in Christian love and expect to do so through these anxious times. We hope that the laity and clergy of our conference will strive to do so as well.

We know going into the special General Conference, whatever the outcome, including the possibility that no proposal gets sufficient support to pass, people will be heartbroken. Laity and clergy, many whom have given lifetimes of service to the UMC, are anxious about the future of their local churches and their denomination. We also know that, after General Conference, God will continue calling each of us to ministry, and the Holy Spirit will continue to lead. As the storm battered the boat containing Jesus and his followers, they called out, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" Jesus calmed the sea and asked his disciples, "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" Indeed, during this time in our church's history, it feels stormy. But we can be assured that Jesus is still guiding our journey and that God is not done with us.

Over the next couple of months, we ask you to pray for us and for all of the General Conference delegates. Feel free to continue contacting us to let us know your thoughts, concerns, and hopes about the future of our church. If you are planning to attend the special General Conference in February, please let us know! Our conference reserve delegates will be seated together in the stands and will be glad to have you join them during this historic meeting. 
